

With its circulation of more than three million and its contributions from such luminaries as Walt Disney, Albert Einstein, Agatha Christie, F. Scott Fitzgerald, H.G. Wells, Clark Gable, Mae West, Franklin Roosevelt and Winston Churchill, Liberty was second in prominence only to The Saturday Evening Post at a time when illustrated magazines were among the most important forms of mass entertainment.

Liberty Magazine Historical Archive, 1924-1950 features the complete run of the magazine, including more than 17,000 stories and articles. Never before available, these primary sources range from mystery and suspense to autobiography and humor, revealing the attitudes, lifestyles, fads and desires of America in the first half of the 20th century. Also included are more than 1,300 full-color magazine covers and more than 10,000 one- and two-color illustrations, as well as thousands of advertisements from the period.

By partnering with some of the world's most prestigious institutions and carefully selected advisory boards, we have built world-class collections of these invaluable resources, making them widely accessible to scholars and researchers. Dedicated researchers would previously have had to devote years to locate, visit and review the documents in these special collections. *Gale Digital Collections* make these rare works available 24/7, offering instant access to centuries of primary sources and opening up new opportunities for original research.



Securing and digitizing the world's most treasured primary sources

Digital capture of primary sources is performed either on-site at the source institution or offsite at one of our preferred vendors. All image capture is carefully conducted in secure, clean environments, handling the original documents with the most extreme care. In instances where the originals are brittle or can be potentially damaged, we work directly with the source institution to ensure the preservation of the documents. A number of quality-assurance steps are then taken to ensure the quality and accuracy of the materials as they are converted into text. Various levels of metadata are then added enabling detailed searching. Our sophisticated quality control system works to process more than one million pages per week, with individuals reviewing every page of every document before it reaches our customers.



Agile speed and flexibility

While the raw data is being digitized, our Agile team develops the research platform. The Agile approach is based upon a high degree of collaboration between publishing, content delivery, user-testing, IT, and many other departments. With the Agile approach, we enable our organization to be much faster and more flexible. Agile allows us to get users to review and test our products early in the process and make changes as we proceed, helping us to ensure delivery of the best possible product to our customers.
