

HAWAII STUDENTS WIN 2012-13 SIEMENS AWARDS FOR ADVANCED PLACEMENT Siemens Foundation Recognizes Sonia Chang of Honolulu and Steven Okada of Wailuku for STEM Achievement

ISELIN, NJ, February 6, 2013— Sonia Chang, a senior at Punahou School in Honolulu, and Steven Okada, a senior at Maui High School in Kahului, today were named the Hawaii state winners of the 2012-13 Siemens Awards for Advanced Placement, a signature program of the Siemens Foundation administered by the College Board. The awards recognize the nation's top achievers in Advanced Placement Program® (AP®) courses in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) with a \$2,000 college scholarship to one male and one female student in each state. Two national winners (one male and one female) are also recognized, each receiving a \$5,000 scholarship. This year, 101 high school students in all 50 states – including 93 seniors and 8 juniors – were honored.


