In 2016, there will be **10,380** new cases of cancer in children under 15 years old in the United States.¹

The incidence rate of cancer in children has increased **0.6% annually** over the past 35 years.³



Childhood cancer is the leading cause of death by disease among children between the ages of 1 and 19 in the US.⁴



Less than 4% of the federal government total funding for cancer research is dedicated to childhood cancer each year.⁵

The **causes** of most childhood cancers are **unknown**, and for the most part, these cancers cannot be prevented. ⁶
