David Knopman is a 1972 graduate of Dartmouth College, a 1973 graduate of Dartmouth Medical School and a 1975 graduate of the University of Minnesota Medical School. He did his internship at Hennepin County Medical Center, Minneapolis, a Neurology residency at the University of Minnesota and a fellowship in Behavioral Neurology at Hennepin County Medical Center and the University of Minnesota. He was a faculty member at the University of Minnesota from 1980 to 2000.

Knopman joined the Department of Neurology at the Mayo Clinic Rochester Minnesota in 2000, where he is currently Professor of Neurology, Mayo Clinic College of Medicine, a Consultant in Neurology at the Mayo Clinic, and a co-investigator in the Mayo Alzheimer's Disease Research Center. His research and clinical interests have been in dementing illnesses. He is an author on more than 300 articles on various topics in dementia.

Knopman is Deputy Editor of *Neurology*. He was the senior author on the 2001 AAN Practice Parameter on the Diagnosis of Dementia and was co-chair of the NIA-AA committee that drafted the revised criteria for Alzheimer's disease dementia. In 2012, he became a member of the Medical and Scientific Advisory Council of the Alzheimer's Association.
