Opill® is a daily birth control pill for those who want to avoid pregnancy.¹ It is a progestin-only pill (POP), sometimes referred to as the "mini pill."¹ Unlike combined oral contraceptives (COCs), Opill® does not contain estrogen.¹ This means it has fewer listed contraindications (situations where the product should not be used) than COCs.iiii Opill® is a safe and effective birth control option for most® people who can become pregnant.iii

Is there any difference between prescription strength and OTC strength of the product? No. Opill\* is full prescription strength.vii

Who should not use Opill\*? Do not use Opill\* if you have or ever had breast cancer." See Opill\* label for list of warnings.

What are the most common side effects of Opill®? While taking Opill® you may experience changes in your menstrual bleeding pattern.

How does Opill' work? Opill' works by thickening the cervical mucus, which helps block sperm from getting to an egg,<sup>1,viii</sup> It also stops the release of an egg from the ovaries in some cycles.<sup>1,ix</sup> Based on a recent study, most (2 of 3) users do not ovulate when using Opill' correctly.<sup>1x</sup> Opill' starts working 48 hours after the first dose.<sup>1</sup>

Do you have to take Opill® at the same time every day? Yes! If you take a pill more than 3 hours late, OR you miss one or more pills, you may be more likely to get pregnant.¹ In these cases, take one pill as soon as you remember.¹ Then, go back to taking your pill at the usual time.¹ This means you may take 2 pills in 1 day.¹ Use a condom (or another barrier method) every time you have sex during the 2 days (48 hours) after you restart Opill®.¹ You should not take a break between packs.¹

Are there any age restrictions for Opill\*? No, the FDA approved Opill\* without any age restriction!! Major medical organizations such as the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists and the American Medical Association, among others, support OTC access for all ages.
